According to the UNHCR:

- The total amount of registered Syrians in Jordan is 666,596 as of 24 June 2018. This is 483 registered Syrians more than last month.
- There is no backlog of Syrians awaiting registration. Syrians can now register with UNHCR at its centres in Irbid and Amman upon first contact the same day.
- From the total registered Syrians, almost 81.1% are residing in the host community, while 18.9% are situated in camps.
- 57.2% of the total registered Syrian refugees are children between 0-17 years.

2. Overview of the response in June 2018

Save the Children Jordan (SCJ) has been amongst the leading agencies to respond to the humanitarian needs of Syrian refugees fleeing to Jordan since its outbreak. SCJ's focus is to develop, implement and sustain a continuum of highly successful programmes to improve living conditions and opportunities for children, youth, women and families. Our programmes are child-focused including education, child protection, child poverty and health and nutrition.

Education:

Early Learning Centre (ELC) – Zaatari camp & Azraq camp & J&J

Project Title: JOR Supporting Early Learning Centres (ELCs) in Zaatari and Azraq camp

Save the Children Jordan runs 4 ELCs in Zaatari and Azraq camps. The ELCs provide Early Childhood Care and Development (ECCD) programs to children aged 3-4 years old in order to support them before they transition to primary education. The programme includes sessions for the parents and caregivers of the children (both male and female). These sessions are conducted weekly over a period of two months, aiming to enhance and develop positive relationships between the parents and their children at home.

ELC's activities:

- Continued running the program (Zaatari and Azraq camps).
- End of the first cycle of the parental sessions (Zaatari and Azraq camps).

- Refugee day celebration and Eid festival (Pizza Day indoor and outdoor activities (Zaatari and Azraq camps).
- Outreach for new cycle at Edon under J&J project.
- Renovation for CBO building, under J&J project.

Meetings conducted with:

- CCM meeting at Azraq camp (UNCHR).
- ELC'S field coordinators.

Trainings:

- **Induction from H.R for CBO's staff (12) under J&J project.**
- **Heart training for CBO's staff (12) under J&J project.**

Basic Education:

Makani Centres:

Save the Children Jordan runs **12 "Makani – My Space"** centres, funded by UNICEF, where children are provided with quality learning programs that include **basic and advanced literacy and numeracy** sessions in a stimulating learning environment. We also run **18 helpdesks** across the country which provides case referrals and information on available services.

The centres run in double shifts (morning and afternoon) depending on children's formal schooling hours.

During the month of June, the following achievements were made under our Education project:

Host Community:

- There were a total of **60 beneficiaries** (all Syrian females) reached through **2 awareness sessions** at SC Jordan's Helpdesks located in Irbid and Jareh.
- There were a total of **3 informal education cases** (all Syrian females) referred to the Islamic Charity Centre Society in Al Ramtha.
- There was a total of **13 beneficiaries** (6 Syrian males and 7 Syrian females) referred to Health and Financial service providers. The service providers that received the cases were: Care International, Atfaluna, HandiCap Jordan, Institute for Family Health and Jesuit Refugee Service – Jordan.
- There was a total of **4 protection cases** (4 Syrian males) managed in Public schools through SC Jordan Helpdesks in Ramtha.

Through our Makani Centres:

- **1,367 students** were enrolled in LSS at SCJ Makani centres (321 Syrian females, 273 Syrian males, 396 Jordanian females, and 377 Jordanian males).
- **16 students** were enrolled in LSS at SCJ Makani centres (8 Syrian females, 6 Syrian males, 2 Jordanian females, and 0 Jordanian males).
- **342 children** (10-18 years old) were enrolled in LS at SCJ Makani centres (43 Syrian females, 77 Syrian males, 140 Jordanian females, and 82 Jordanian males).

Camps:

Due to the fact all schools are on summer vacation, there are no new achievements in June

- SCJ has implemented renovation work for three CBOs according to need. The maintenance work included the painting and repairing of the ceiling and the repairing of the CBOs electrics.
- SCJ team managed to provide the fancywork and crochet with a complementary kit.
- The total beneficiaries reached in this grant met the target. There were 629 children, 436 caregivers, 401 who complete the Handicraft training and 400 caregivers who received start-up kit.
- SCJ managed to finalize the final report for this grant.

Lego Project

- SCJ conducted extensive trainings on the new Lego approach for all implementing caregivers.
- SCJ distributed 60 Lego boxes to 6 CBOs who were involved in this project.
- CBOs and caregivers with SC staff have started registration for children and implementation in Nazal area.

Addressing livelihoods and child protection-related barriers to school enrolment Project- Funded by Hands Up Foundation/Save The Children UK:

During this reporting period June, 2018:

- Conducted Market analysis for the Aqaba governorate in order to start vocation training.
- Renewed the rent contract with Red Crescent Society in Aqaba to reach more beneficiaries.
- Conducted two-day livelihood training for Ghour Al Safi Staff about Financial literacy and budget cost saving.
- Asfari foundation from UK visited the project and met with the beneficiaries in Northern Ghour.
- Distributed 21 start-up kits for Ghour Al Safi beneficiaries.
- Sent an official letter to special economic zone authority in order to coordinate the sessions for child labour and home bound girls.

BMZ funded Project (Kicked-off in June 2018):

- In our target areas of Zarqa, Rusaifa and Mafraq – Al Khaldeh...
 - 196 application forms were received from Syrian and Jordanian, men and women, who are seeking new job opportunities
 - More than 55 follow-up visits and phone calls were conducted for our beneficiaries.
 - Three child care centres were established and furnished.
- **Since the start of the project:**
 - 255 beneficiaries, Syrian and Jordanian, men and women, have completed their Personal Development Training from the host community in our target areas of Zarqa, Rusaifa and Mafraq – Al Khaldeh.
 - 167 students were targeted from VTCs, 163 students received and completed the Personal Development Training, 155 were linked and finished their OJT, and 110 beneficiaries of them linked to job opportunities after completed their vocational training at the VTCs.
 - 201 beneficiaries have been linked to on-job trainings.
 - 114 of them have completed their OJT and 69 beneficiaries linked to job opportunities.

AMAN Safe You, Safe Me “SYSM” Royal Norwegian Embassy: The Goal of the project is the Participation of Syrian, Palestinian and Jordanian community in community based Child Protection activities for active prevention, identification and response of CP concerns and GBV with special focus on Child Marriage.

- 51 children reached through SYSM, raising awareness sessions regarding Child Protection and prevention from Gender Based Violence via CBOs (Community Based Organizations); 38 females in Amman, 13 females in Jerash.
- 9 child protections and GBV cases identified, managed and referred to other service providers (3 males, 6 females).
- 21 children reached through individual psychological therapy; in Amman (3 males and 18 females).
- 19 children reached through PSS activities (psychosocial activities); in Amman (7 males and 12 females).
- 6 Syrian beneficiaries reached through CPC awareness raising events and gathering in Amman (3 males, 4 females)

Education through Case management (ECHO consortium)

“Enabling access to educational pathways and safer learning environment” project funded by ECHO. This project is a partnership between European Civil Protection and Humanitarian Aid Operations – ECHO, Save the Children, INTERSOS and TDH.

Updated by the end of month of June from the Save the Children Jordan side:

- By the end of June, the total Out of School Children (OOF) registered in education pathways were as follows:
 - 308 in formal education.
 - 65 in non-formal education.
 - 31 Jordanian, 342 Syrian.
- School visits were conducted in 18 schools, where 140 teachers and 52 school principals, principle assistants and counsellors were accessed.
- A Community Committees (CC) training was conducted. 91 people attended the training, (67 Jordanians and 24 Syrians, of those 36 were male and 55 were female).
- The first 3 payments were distributed as follows:
 - First and the second instalment...
 - 134 House Hold (HH) received the cash assistant, which covered 210 children.
 - Third instalment...
 - 151 HH received the cash assistant, which covered 228 children.
 - Fourth payment prepared and we are in process of transferring the money and it will be as the following...
 - 153 HH received the cash assistant, which will cover 215 children.
- In June, SCJ began conducting the care giver session 51 (beneficiaries finish and attend full cycle).

Health

Community Health Services Program in Zaatari Camp began implementing staff from Save the Children Jordan in April 2018. The main objective of this project is to improve the health status of the population in the camp through the provision of preventative and community-based health care services.

- During the month of June in the camp...
 - 1 capacity building training took place for community health volunteers covering 80 volunteers.
 - Home visits and follow up visits for all health-related cases.
 - Refer all cases need health follow up for health facilities.

- Raising awareness regarding head lice's and diarrhoea prevention.
- Share the reproductive health defaulter's total cases with Reproductive health partners in the camp and refer all cases for their follow up appointments.
- Share the immunisation defaulters cases with MOH in the camp and refer all cases for their appointments.

9. Security [key contact: Faris Alayaseh]

Overall security level in-country (please specify if changed since last SitRep and if it varies between different parts of the operational area/country programme).

According to the Gallup 2018 Law and Order study, Jordan is the 22nd safest country globally and the 2nd in Arab world. The Kingdom has dropped 12 places from last year, in 2017 it was ranked 9th globally. According to the study the drop “was a normal reflection of the current economic and security challenges the Kingdom is facing amidst a turbulent region.”

Overall the security level in-country remains “Low,” while the northern region remains “High.” During the last reporting period, the northern region experienced many attempts at illegal crossings by smugglers or terrorist groups. Stray shelling incidents in Jordan were also reported during this last period. The Syrian Observatory for Human Rights was quoted on Sunday July 1, stating that due to the intense bombings around 198,000 Syrians have fled the south-western city of Daraa, to the borders of Jordan and Israel.

Prime Minister Omar Razzaz announced that Jordan would no longer be able to receive any more Syrian refugees, as the Kingdom has reached its capacity. Security along the Syria-Jordan border has been tightened by the Jordan Armed Forces.

Jordanian officials stated that talks between Jordan, the US and Russia are ongoing concerning the protection of a de-escalation zone in south-western parts of Syria. The Jordan Armed Forces has begun to send convoys of humanitarian aid to the Syrian people affected by the situation inside Syria.

Border Issues and Experiences:

- 26 shells and mortars have fallen in the Jordanian territories, some of which hit residential areas with no casualties. Many of the shells fell in abandoned areas.
- On June 12 and 14, 2018, Border Guards thwarted an attempt to smuggle a large quantity of drugs through the Syria-Jordan border. Confiscated during the first and second case were 7 bags containing...
 - 5,000 Tramadol pills (first case)
 - 1,131,000 Captagon pills (first case)
 - 329 palm-sized sheets of hashish (first case)
 - 1,127,000 Capatagon pills (second case)
 - 2 handguns (first and second cases)

Nationally, the armed robbery phenomena continues as a main security concern, however the number of these cases has decreased during this reported period. Meanwhile, Criminal Investigation Department (CID) personnel are still in pursuit of people who have conducted many raids.

- On Tuesday, 19th June 2018, in Azraq, Highway Patrols arrested a young man and a woman in a vehicle, who are suspected of stealing SR12,000 from Saudis in Al Omari Centre near the Saudi-Jordanian border.
- On Tuesday, 19th June 2018, in Irbid, CID personnel have arrested an individual on suspicion of having robbed 25 houses in Ramtha since 2015.

Public unrest, demonstrations and protests is still one of the largest concerns in Jordan. Many rallies took place in Amman and other cities around the Kingdom through the reporting period. The unrest was in response to the income tax draft and hike prices of fuel derivatives and resulted in minor incidents among security staff.

- On Tuesday, 5th June 2018, in Amman, hundreds of citizens rallied in a march from Al Mashaghel roundabout in Tabarbour and marched towards the Royal Court. The protestors were in support of His Majesty King Abdullah demands to change the government and open a comprehensive national dialogue on many issues and concerns of citizens.
- On Friday, 8th June 2018, after seven days of protests against economic policies and social injustice, protests near the Prime Ministry, located at the Fourth Circle area in Amman, came to a halt.

Anti-Narcotic Department (AND) arrested suspected drug dealers and confiscated a huge amount of drug materials in many cases around the Kingdom.

- On Saturday, 10th June 2018, around the Kingdom, AND personnel arrested 18 suspected drug dealers in various cases of illegal sales and the promotion of narcotics.
- On Wednesday, 13th June 2018, around the Kingdom, AND personnel arrested 22 suspected drug dealers in various cases of illegal sales and the promotion of narcotics.

The situation in both Zaatari and Azraq camps remain relatively calm during the reporting period. The biggest hazard in the camps is still the traffic accidents. No security incidents involving UN Agencies and/or I/NGOs' staff.

- On 15th June 2018, in Azraq Camp, CARE SFP reported a road traffic accident (RTA) that involved their staff members, who were injured while commuting from Azraq Town to the camp. Seven of CARE SFP's staff were evacuated to the hospital with minor injuries. Full incident report has yet to be provided by CARE SFP.
- On 8th June 2018, in Azraq Camp, an allocated shelter in Village 3 got burned. The Civil Defence put out the fire with no human injuries reported. NFIs, documents and private furniture was burnt in the incident.
- On 10th June, in Azraq Camp, an RTA took place on Azraq Highway involving a bus carrying 23 security guards working in the Azraq Camp for the Scorpion Security Company. The majority of the guards were evacuated to hospitals. Eight guards were classified as "Medium." The Scorpion Security Company site manager reported that company had to use their backup guards to compensate for those injured.

No incidents were reported during the reporting period.

Key events that might affect the security situation

While the security situation in Jordan will likely remain calm during the upcoming period, recurring civil unrest instances organized in response to local and regional developments will continue to take place. Staff members are reminded to consult with the security team prior to undergoing travel to other governorates. A large-scale Syrian people were affected by the military operation in Daraa, which poses a high risk of refugee influx into Jordan. This will have an impact on both the economic and security situation in the country. With that being said, the risk of more stray mortar shells falling into Jordanian territory can also expose the operation in that area to high risk.
